
SOCIAL STUDIES

CURRENT EVENTS

The one semester course will provide students the opportunity to become knowledgeable and well-versed of the major issues throughout our world. Students will develop a greater understanding of global, national, and local issues and the impact each of individually and collectively. In addition, students will be required to analyze, discuss, research, and present topics based on factual information.



INTRODUCTION TO ECONOMICS

It's more than supply and demand! This half-credit course integrates micro and macroeconomics. Economic theory and practices, the nature and functions of markets, national and global economic issues, and government fiscal policies are he foundations of this course. Concepts are taught through simulations and authentic assessments. Economic growth indicators are analyzed and domestic/foreign events discussed to enhance economic literacy!

AFRICAN- AMERICAN/BLACK & PUERTO RICAN/LATINO STUDIES

Course of Studies is a one-credit, year-long elective. This course examines how historical movements, legislation, and wars affected the citizenship rights of these groups. Coursework will provide students with tools to identify historical and contemporary tensions around race and difference; map economic and racial disparities over time; strengthen their own identity development; and address bias in their communities. So, if you are really interested in learning about American History, then register for this class.



EARLY 20TH the CENTURY (1952 to Present)

This course begins where the 10th grade U.S. History course concluded. This year-long elective will continue to explore the history of the United States in the 20th century including but not listed to the Civil Rights Movement, the Vietnam War, and the Cold War. We will continue into the 21st century by studying September 11th which led to the Iraq War and, eventually, the withdrawal of Afghanistan. The source will, as well, examine economic, political, and social developments during the 20th and 21st centuries and analyze the ways in which these developments continue to impact various groups of people.



INTRODUCTION TO PSYCHOLOGY



SOCIOLOGY I AND II


